

#### **Important City Tax** exemption information

The new year is the time for residents to apply for the over 65 or Disability property tax exemption. To make an appointment, at the convenience of the taxpaver, call Kathleen Walls at 322-9804.

The maximum yearly income requirements are \$15,000 for a single person and \$30,000 for a married couple. Social Security income is not counted toward the maximum. The last day to apply is May 1st.

### Trustees Scholarship ...

The "Trustees of New Castle Common Scholarship Fund" was established in 1983 for **eligible residents of the City of New Castle**.

An applicant must be a senior in high school or a recent high school graduate who is entering the freshman year in an accredited undergraduate college or university as a full-time student in the coming September. Funded applicants from previous years who continue to meet the eligibility requirements are invited to re-apply for grant funding if available.

The scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need and scholastic ability. If the applicant is a dependent, the parent must be a resident of the City of New Castle.

Applications and instructions are available from the Trustees of New Castle Common, Delaware Street, New Castle.

Note that student's application and a transcript of final grades must be received by the Scholarship Committee no later than July 1, 2015.

#### **Code Enforcement Corner**

**City Code Enforcement** helps to maintain and improve the quality of life of New Castle City residents by administering an unbiased enforcement program to correct violations of City zoning, property maintenance and building codes;

Complaint forms are available at the City Offices or on the City Web site at newcastlecity.delaware.gov. Complaints are handled on a confidential basis; however, if feedback and/or updates are requested, name, address and phone number need to be provided with the complaint.



Mosquito Control, In February? The City of New Castle will be cooperating with the State of Delaware Division of Fish & Wildlife to maximize mosquito control in the area in

an effort to combat mosquito borne diseases. The City will aggressively enforce City health codes that require the elimination of standing water, such as in tires or buckets. So, now is a good time to do a quick property check, with the leaves are off the trees, and the plants dormant for the winter it is easier to see places on your property where this could be a problem. Look for potential areas for mosquito breeding, such as tires, buckets or tubs, anywhere water can collect and stagnate. Eliminating these types of areas will go a long way this spring and summer to help with mosquito control.

#### It is the responsibility of property owners to maintain the sidewalk in front of their property within 24 hours of the end of a weather event.

**The New Castle City Code, section 209-1:** Sidewalks require a minimum 3 feet of clearance within 24 hours of a snow event ending. One should not anticipate warm weather following a storm to clear the sidewalk.

Also, please remember to clear any fire hydrant; this could save crucial minutes in an emergency situation.

#### **Clearing Ice:**

Here are some tips on clearing ice off sidewalks, from our neighbors to the north in the City of Edmonton:

- Pile snow in a place where it will not run across your sidewalk when it melts and aim your downspouts away from areas where people walk to keep your sidewalks clear during freeze-thaw cycles. Do NOT pile snow in the roadway.
- Warmer weather during the day can make ice soft, so it's easier to chip or shovel away.
- Spread sand or gravel on icy patches to make your sidewalk safer for pedestrians. Spreading sand on a sidewalk before ice forms can also make future ice easier to remove.
- Microwaving sand in a microwave-safe container and spreading it while it is still warm can make it more effective. It will embed itself in to the ice, creating a gritty top layer.
